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

- 2. Exhibits must be pre-entered via e-mail to abbie2@ksu.edu by July 15. All exhibits are to be entered on Tuesday, August 9 from 8:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m.
- 3. All entries must have been grown by the exhibitor as a part of his or her supervised agricultural experience program. All exhibits must have been produced during the year specified for the class.
- 4. Grain and seed exhibits must be exactly one quart in each sample. Samples of incorrect size will be disqualified.
- 5. Each exhibit must contain a label showing exhibitor's name, chapter, kind of crop, variety and class number entered in.
- 6. Each ear of corn must be in its natural condition and not more than one percent of its grain missing.
- 7. Each exhibitor is limited to ten entries in bedding plants or houseplants. Exhibitors are limited to five entries per class in the fruits and vegetables classes.
- 8. Premium money will be awarded only to those members whose exhibits are brought to the fair.
- 9. Please refer to the Linn County Fair FFA Supplement for a complete listing of classes. This supplement can be obtained by contacting the Linn County Extension Office or your local FFA Advisor.

LAKE REGION SOLID WASTE AUTHORITY-SUSTAINABILITY RECOGNITION AWARD

To be eligible for the Sustainability Recognition Award, 4-H and FFA members will need to declare their entry at the check in table when entering their project for the Linn County Fair. When declared their project will be judged in the division entered and the Sustainability category.

The Lake Region Solid Waste Authority will be sponsoring the Sustainability Category for the youth, and entries will be based on the following criteria;

- illustrates the benefits of recycling and/or using recycled materials OR
- encourages household composting OR
- promotes waste reduction and/or landfill diversion

Awards will be presented at the Linn County Fair Awards program on Friday during the Linn County Fair.

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2.	Market hogs may be barrow or gilts; any animal shown in breeding
	classes is not eligible for premium sale.

- 3. No 4-H/FFA member may enter other than the animals represented in his/her project.
- 4. Members will be responsible for having their swine weighed.
- 5. No clippers allowed in swine barn; hair must be ½" long. The use of oils or powders is prohibited.
- 6. Bred and Owned Market Swine must be raised on exhibitor's farm, bred and owned by youth or immediate family or grandparents.
- 7. Classes will be divided and shown by weights only. If a pig is tagged with the official ear tag and weighs at fair time as a market animal, it can only be shown in the market divisions.
- 8. Swine show order will be breeding classes, showmanship classes (Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Beginner), market classes followed by bred and owned.
- 9. All swine exhibitors must be current on YQCA certification to exhibit.
- 10. The top two placings in each class will show for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion.
- 11. All hogs must have an official 4-H EID ear tag.
- 12. All Market hogs must have destination / sale form on file with the fair office.
- 13. Breeding registration papers must be in the youth or immediate family name by June 15.

1. Every exhibit entered must have been made by a student enrolled

and 3 market sheep. A total of 6 head can be shown by one member.

- 4. Animals shown in the breeding class cannot be shown in the market class and are not eligible for premium sale.
- 5. At the time of weigh-in and show, all market lambs must be slick shorn (not to exceed .2") with an even length of wool covering above the hock and knee (head and belly excluded).
- 6. Sheep show order will be breeding classes, showmanship classes (Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Beginner), market classes followed by bred and owned. Youth must have completed YQCA to exhibit.
- 7. Showing of Sheep Sheep must be shown with all four feet on the ground. Exhibitors may use collars, collars with a short lead, or halters when showing. No extreme collars (spike/training) will be allowed.
- 8. Breeding registration papers must be in the youth or immediate family name by June 15.

Market Lamb Special Rules:

- 1. Classes will be divided and shown by weight ONLY.
- 2. Bred and Owned Class will be shown for Market Sheep only.
- 3. Bred and Owned must be raised on exhibitor's farm by youth or immediate family or grandparents. Ribbons will be given, but no premium money.
- 4. All lambs must have their lamb teeth.

- 1. No 4-H/FFA member may enter other than the animals represented in his/her project.
- 2. No 4-H/FFA member may enter and exhibit more than two in each class.
- 3. All market rabbits will be judged on meat quality.
- 4. Each rabbit is to be legibly and permanently tattooed in its left ear for identification prior to entry at fair.
- 5. All rabbits will be divided into age classes (pre-junior, junior, 6-8 months, and senior) and judged according to their breed standards as listed in the ARBA "Standard of Perfection." Only breeds recognized by ARBA may be shown, with the exception of the mixed breed class.
- 6. The mixed breed class will be judged on conditioning and overall health. Rabbits not eligible for other classes can be shown in the mixed breed class.
- 7. The mixed breed class winners will not be eligible for best of breed.
- Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering rabbits daily. 8.
- 9. Fur Classes only one entry per class exhibitor and will be judged in their cages.

- 1. Members are limited to 5 entries in each phase in which they are enrolled and they can only make entries in those classes. A member must be enrolled in the project that he or she is exhibiting.
- 2. Judging on all classes except market poultry will be done on the basis of exhibition and production qualities. Market Poultry will be judged on meat quality.
- 3. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering exhibits daily.
- All poultry except waterfowl must show proof that they are Pullorum-typhoid clean by one of the following methods:

 a. Originate from a U.S. Pullorum-typhoid clean flock as evidenced by an official VS Form 9-3.

b. Present evidence (documentation) that the entries were purchased from a U.S. Pullorum-typhoid clean source and have been the only poultry on the premises.

c. Present an official VS 9-2 Form, signed by an official testing agent, showing the entries have had a negative Pullorum-typhoid test within the preceding 90 days. Failure to do so will be immediate removal from fairgrounds.

- 5. Showmanship exhibitors in the 4-H Poultry division of showmanship will receive ribbons only.
- 6. Pigeons Exhibitor may enter 1 bird per breed as singles, not to exceed three entries.

- 2. Nursing home or assisted living resident participants in each class will be designated by an "N" following the class number.
- 3. NO exhibit which has received a prize in any previous year, shall be allowed to compete for a prize.
- 4. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit per class, with the exception of livestock entries.
- 5. All pictures and wall hangings must be able to hang unassisted with no special hardware.
- 6. All livestock must be typical of the breed they represent, no stags or late cuts allowed to show.
- 7. Check special rules for each class area. Additional classes will not be added.
- 8. The Superintendent's decisions are final concerning classes and eligibility within their area.
- 9. In all classes, or where there are one or more exhibitors, the judge reserves the right to place the entry as they see fit in regards to placing. The judge's decision is final & shall be treated with respect.
- 10. A Champion and Reserve Ribbon may be awarded upon judge's discretion in each of the divisions. Each division Champion winner will receive a \$5 cash prize or gift certificate provided by the Linn County Fair Association. Each Reserve Champion in adult division may receive a \$3 cash award from the Linnette Community Club. Each Reserve Champion in children and youth division may receive a \$3 cash award from Mine Creek Community Club. A \$10 cash prize will be added to the Adult division Champion of Floral Hall exhibits from an anonymous donor.
- 11. Premiums will be paid by the Linn County Fair Association and will be ready to pick up at the Linn County Extension Office on Monday, August 22 following the fair. Premium money will not be mailed out. Premium money not picked up by October 1 will be redeposited into the Linn County Fair Association account.
- 12. Exhibits removed or not left on the grounds until scheduled release time will forfeit ALL premium money, not just for that exhibit.
- 13. An exhibit or entry may only be entered in 4-H or open class, not both.

- 2. The top two blues in each market steer class will show for Grand and Reserve Champion Market Steer and the top two blues in each market heifer class will show for Grand and Reserve Champion Market Heifer and the overall Grand and Reserve will be selected from these four animals.
- 3. All 4-H/FFA beef exhibitors are limited to showing three (3) breeding heifers and three (3) market animals. A total of six (6) head may be shown by one member.
- 4. All beef animals must enter with superintendent at the fair weigh-in.
- 5. Rate of Gain winner must weigh in at official county spring date and show at fair to be eligible for the award.
- 6. Bred and Owned Market Beef will be shown for market beef only; they will show just after the champion market animal is named. Must be raised on exhibitor's farm, bred and owned by youth or immediate

- 5. All components used in construction should be dust free, clean, free of chips, scuffs, or cracks
- 6. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®
- 7. Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks.
- 8. The use of existing "store bought" sets for major elements of the display is <u>not</u> allowed. Use of figurines from sets is allowed, as are using individual bricks to create something different than the set it came from. "Store bought" sets should be considered an arts and crafts entry.
- 9. Displays must have significant architectural components. Examples of architectural components include walls, windows, doors, roofs, canopies, flying buttresses, etc. Landscapes are strongly discouraged.
- 10. Architectural components should have a consistent look, walls and roofs that have no pattern or consistency will be deducted one ribbon placing.
- 11. Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks.
- 12. Doors should open and close, windows can be either fixed or open and close.
- 13. Vehicles that are intended to stay in a single place should be affixed to base plates with sticky tack, hot glue, or other method.
- 14. You can use a partial wall or no wall, called a reveal, to show what is happening inside of a structure are acceptable, for example only having three walls to allow an unobstructed view into a room.
- 15. Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. For example, marry-go-rounds, doors, elevators, etc. If used, judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation.
- 16. Artistic designs with no architectural design/components are not permitted and two ribbon placings will be deducted.
- 17. Each exhibit must include an Architectural Block Construction information packet:
 - 17a. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Architectural Block Construction Exhibit Information Form" which is available at the Extension office or at www.STEM4KS.com. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
 - 17b. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items:
 - 1. At least one drawing of the desired architecture on graph paper, multiple views (top, front, side) are preferred, they do not need to be to scale.

- 1. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the Kansas 4-H STEM Architectural Block Construction project to exhibit in this division.
- 2. Each exhibitor may enter 3 exhibits. Exhibits must have been constructed during the current 4-H year.
- 3. Total exhibit dimensions may not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep.
- 4. All exhibits should be placed in a sturdy see through enclosure with a top, bottom, and 4 sides. A fish tank or a clear tub turned upside down with the exhibit placed on the lid would be an acceptable enclosure. This is to keep exhibit components from being "scattered to parts u known" at the fair. The outer dimensions of the enclosure are part of the

- 3. A sample of each product will be saved for display. The remainder of the product may be claimed after judging. All products not claimed following judging will be discarded.

- 2. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been constructed or repaired during the current 4-H year.
- 3. Wheeled exhibits must utilize a braking mechanism which prevents the exhibit from freely rolling while on display.
- 4. Each exhibit must be free-standing or sufficiently supported by an exhibitor supplied support system that is moveable and is part of the total demission's and weight of the exhibit as described previously. Exhibit boards should have a portable and moveable base. No exhibits may be staked to the ground for display.
- 5. Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent it from toppling over while on display.
- 6. Painting or spot painting is not allowed on projects after arrival on fairgrounds. If wet paint is detected by judges or superintendents one ribbon placing will be deducted.
- 7. Repair projects having adequate original finish need not be repainted.
- 8. Cutting surfaces, such as blades or knives, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam "pool noodles" and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
- 9. Exhibits that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that is intended to be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
- 10. If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and lines should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires.
- 11. Electric powered (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch.
- 12. Each exhibit must include an Ag Mechanics information packet:
 - 12a. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Ag Mechanics Exhibit Information Form" which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at www.STEM4KS.com. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
 - 12b. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items:
 - 1. Bill of materials for the project with associated costs, scrap items used may be listed as having a \$0.00 cost.
 - 2. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state.
 - 3. If appropriate schematics or working drawings relating to the creation or repair, this is not required for display boards.
 - 4. If appropriate, operating instructions.
- 13. Additionally, exhibitors may create an optional video (not required)

- 2. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. Weight may not exceed 15 pounds.
- 3. All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.
- 4. Robots may be powered by an electrical, battery, water, air or solar source only. Junk drawer robots may be powered by a non-traditional power source. Robots powered by fossil fuels/flammable liquids <u>will be</u> <u>disqualified</u>. Robots that include weaponry of any kind will be <u>disqualified</u>.
- 5. Remote controlled robots are allowed under certain conditions provided that the robot is not drivable. Remote controlled cars, boats, planes and/or action figures, etc. are not allowed.
- 6. Each robot must be in operable working condition. The judges will operate each robot to evaluate its workmanship.

Astronomy

- 1. Telescopes entered in this division may be built from a kit or by original design. Pre-finished telescopes, which require no construction or painting, are not acceptable exhibits.
- 2. Telescopes are limited to no more than six feet in length. They must be placed on a stationary stand that does not allow the telescope to roll and/or fall over. The stand cannot extend past two feet in length or width.
- 3. Each exhibit must include an exhibit information form which should be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. You must also include construction plans (or a photocopy) of the telescope and place it inside the manila envelope.
- 4. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
- 5. Two photographs showing telescope construction and operation are required. Photographs should be mounted on one side of an 8½" x 11" page. A brief caption should accompany each photograph. Place photos in the 10" x 13" manila envelope.

Photo must be from an original(s) taken by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must include a second 11" x 12.5" mat board mounted with standard size print or prints (if more than one photo was used) of the original photo(s) and 3 x 5 cards explaining what manipulation was done and a standard size print of the final photo. May include additional photos (standard size and may be layered) showing editing steps. Place both mat boards in the same protective plastic.
- 14. The black and white class is for black and white prints only. Monochromatic prints, including sepia prints are considered color photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo class.
- 15. Appropriate photo subject matter: Photographic subject matter is expected to follow 4-H standards. For the sense of prohibited subject matter, review the Kansas 4-H member Code of Conduct; in general, if it is not allowable at a 4-H event, it is not allowable in a 4-H photograph.
- 16. Photos with live subjects on railroad right of way or taken from railroad right of way property will not be displayed in Kansas 4-H Photography and will be **disqualified and not judged.**
- 17. Copyright protections must be observed.
- 18. Decisions as to display and/or penalties will be made by the Photography Department Superintendent and the 4-H agent responsible for the photography department.
- 19. State Fair Special Rules. Only one exhibit per 4-H member/exhibitor may be entered. Exhibitors (members) with 8 years or more of 4-H photography project experience may enter 2 photographs as long as the photographs are in different classes. There is no division for the Picture Story or Set class at State Fair.

- 4. Photos are to be mounted across the narrow (11") dimension of an 11" x 12.5" sheet of white or cream studio mat board. Photos mounted on poster board will not be displayed. You may purchase mat boards at the Extension Office.
- 5. Photos must be mounted with the top edge of the print 1" below the top of the mount (board is always oriented narrow side up). The sides of the print must be equal distance from the two sides of the mount.
- 6. A permanent mount must be made by using photographic adhesive.
- 7. The Kansas State Fair 4-H Photography ID Form (available from the Extension Office) must be used and mounted correctly on the bottom front of the mat board. This will be illustrated in an instruction sheet.
- 8. No lettering, including dates, is permitted on the front of the mount or on the photo. Only the Kansas State Fair 4-H Photography ID Form is to have lettering on it. No underlay or borders are to be used.
- 9. To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, place mounted photo in protective plastic bag, available from the Extension Office.
- Improperly mounted photos, oversize or undersize photos with the white borders not removed or lettering (including dates) on the photo, will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judges.

- 2. Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the Plexiglass cover (inside, use clear double sided tape to adhere gummed labels) and by attaching a label with the same information on the lower right corner of the box (outside). The inside label is to also indicate the class number.
- 3. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only one of the first three geology classes. Exhibitor may also

For food safety reasons, the size of jars used must not be larger than the jar size stated in the recipe. Note: There are 12-ounce and 24-ounce canning jars available and may be used. Use pint jar process recommendations for 12 ounce jars. Use quart jar process recommendations for 24 ounce jars.

- 7. Each jar exhibit must be labeled. The label must not cover brand name of jar. The label must give: Class No, Product Altitude of Residence, Canning Method (water bath weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), Process Time Pressure (psi), Date Processed including month and year, Name and County/District. Labels may be picked up from the Extension Office.
- 8. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 1/2 cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. All meat jerky must be cooked to an internal temperature of 160° F before or after drying. Dried products must include the recipe and preparation steps. Jerky not heated to an internal temperature of 160° F will be disqualified and not be judged.

FOOD PRESERVATION

- 1. Exhibits must have been preserved since the member's previous year's county fair.
- 2. May exhibit one entry in each class, up to 3 classes.
- 3. Recommended recipes and processing methods must be used. Recipes must be from current, tested resources. Processing methods that will be disqualified include: open kettle canning, oven canning, sun canning and using electric multi-cookers. Untested recipes will be disqualified for food safety reasons. Obtain current recipe sources from the Extension Office.
- Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
- 5. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with entry card, or it will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication and altitude of residence.
- 6. Exhibits must be sealed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with matching brand (ex: use Ball lids on Ball jars, or Kerr lids on Kerr jars, etc.) two piece lids. Do not use colored jars. Do not add fancy padded lids, fabric over-wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. No fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered.

frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only. Calculation must be attached to entry (show all calculations, not just the final answer). Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples on how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at: https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf. This is a New State Fair 2023 rule and will be required at Linn County Fair in 2024. It is required to be eligible for 2023 State Fair selection.

- 5. Alcohol (ex: wine, beer and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with Alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
- 6. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items, such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 bread sticks, 1 loaf bread, etc.
- 7. Under-baked entries will be lowered one or more ribbon placings.
- 8. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing. The exception is for those cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.
- 9. Any baked product that can be removed from the pan should be placed on a plate, covered cardboard or disposable container.
- 10. Exhibits should be in food grade plastic bags, disposable plastic containers or boxes.
- 11. Educational classes: Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display. Follow copyright laws as you are preparing your exhibit. No card table displays are allowed. See 4-H General Rules for poster and display guidelines. NOTE: a collection of your favorite recipes in a recipe box or notebook does not constitute an educational exhibit.
- 12. State Fair Special Rule. A 4-H member may enter one entry in a nonperishable class and one entry in an educational class if they receive a purple ribbon.

Garden Display

Each exhibitor in this class will be limited to 4 square feet of space. Exhibit consists of five different fresh vegetables. Canned vegetables are not accepted. Only one variety of a specific vegetable may be exhibited. Shelled vegetables should not be exhibited. Quality and condition of the exhibit will be considered. Choose vegetables for exhibit that will hold up well during the fair. Avoid over-ripe or over-mature specimens. Those that are slightly under-ripe or slightly immature when picked may last longer. - 4. Each exhibitor is required to identify the notebook by placing a Title Page in the front of the notebook bearing the exhibitor's name, county or district and class 4-H'er is enrolled in and statement of taxonomy used:

a) "Insects in Kansas" book or

b) "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy," which follows www.bugguide.net.

- 5. Specimen pages should be grouped according to order and should include one page per species. If more than one insect is in the photo, an arrow to indicate identified insect should be used.
- 6. Date, common name, full county name and state abbreviation should be included for each species. Collector's name on the specimen page is optional.
- 7. Specimen pages should have two different views of the insect if possible. If pictures are taken on different dates/localities, include information for both.
- 8. A statement describing the habitat where found/host plant may be included and is encouraged and will be worth a bonus 10 points total, not per page. For Intermediate and Advanced notebooks, this is strongly encouraged.
- 9. A divider page is to be placed in front of each order of insects with the order name printed on the tab for the page as well as on the front of the divider page.
- 10. For the Intermediate and Advanced classes, insects are also to be grouped by family behind each order divider.
- 11. If the exhibitor has been in the same class for more than one year, a

- 18. An animal or project may only be exhibited or shown in one project area.
- 19. Rate of gain to be eligible the animal must be present at the official county weigh in.
- 20. Premiums will be paid by the Linn County Fair Association and will be ready to pickup at the Marais des Cygnes Extension Office on Monday, August 21 following the fair. Premium money will not be mailed out. Premium money not picked up by Monday, October 2 will be re-deposited into the Linn County Fair Association account.

- 21. Livestock Auction money will not be available for pickup until 4 weeks after fair unless told otherwise. All outstanding bills with the Marais des Cygnes Extension Office must be paid before checks are released.
- 22. Champion Ribbons \$5. Reserve Champion \$3.
- 23. All registered animals must have registration papers in the youth or an immediate family member name by June 15. Immediate family is brother, sister, mother or father.
- 24. Livestock is to be maintained and fit at the Linn County Fair by the 4H/ FFA member, parent advisor or current Linn County 4H member in good standing.
- 25. No grooming stands in new sheep and goat barn addition.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

- 1. A valid Linn County 4-H /FFA member in good standing can sell if they have not participated in any other county fair premium auction during the current year regardless of species. They must show their own animal in the sale ring. Maximum of only two head per exhibitor, but only one of each species. (example: one sheep & one hog, or one beef and one hog)
- 2. To be sold through the sale the animal must meet the following minimum weight requirements. Animals that don't make weight cannot be base bid.

Meat Goats - 50 lbs. • Sheep - 95 lbs. Swine - 225 lbs. • Market Heifers - 1000 lbs. Market Steers - 1050 lbs.

- 3. All Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goat market animals that received a Champion or Reserve Champion MUST sell in the premium livestock auction.
- 4. If a youth has Champion in all four species then they must choose which two species Champion will sell. If they receive two Champions and a Reserve Champion, then both Champions will sell and the Reserve will have to take the base bid option or be taken home.
- 5. Sale order will be Champion of each species, then Reserve Champion of each species, followed by Blue ribbon, Red ribbon, White ribbon animals in each designated species.
- 6. Anyone who violates sale rules will be barred from the sale in all species this year and any following year. They will also forfeit all premiums to be received by the fair association or sale buyers for current year on all animals including base animals.
- 7. All animals may be subject to a second weight for sale requirements.
- 8. If the owner consigns an animal to the sale and it is sold, the animal CANNOT be purchased and taken home; ownership belongs to

optional.

- 7. The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Other specimens from the United States may be included as long as they are properly labeled and placed in a separate section of the box labeled "Out of State Insects." These specimens will not be included in the count for judging/scoring. Emphasis in judging will be placed on the overall variety of insects represented in the collection, accuracy of identification, skill and technique acquired in mounting of specimens, and overall arrangement and appearance of the collection.
- 8. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.

- 1. All entries should be submitted in an 18 x 24 x 3.5 inch wooden display box with a clear plastic top. Boxes can be handmade or purchased as long as they are of the correct size and do not have a glass top.
- 2. Identification should follow the taxonomy included in www.bugguide.net. Project members are encouraged to progress toward the taxonomy found in "Insects in Kansas" book or "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy" by 2019.
- 3. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box with two identification labels bearing exhibitor's name, county or district and the class the 4-H'er is enrolled in and the statement of taxonomy used in the "Insects in Kansas" book or "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy" which follow www.bugguide.net. One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other on the lower right corner of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.
- 4. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on both of the exhibitor's box identification labels. Only adult specimens can be used in collection boxes; however one female and one male of a species correctly identified can be displayed.
- 5. Arrangement of specimens: The preferred method is to arrange the insects in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Arrangements that run lengthwise of the box are frequently downgraded in judging. Specimens are to be arranged by order in the box, then family where required. The sequence arrangement of the orders in the box will be left up to the member. It is suggested to put the Lepidoptera and Coleoptera in the center of the collection (for Intermediate and Advanced Classes to put these two orders in a box). Then work the other orders around them.
- 6. For each collection class, two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/ locality. Full county name, state abbreviation and collector name on the second label will be required in 2019. Collector's name on the date/locality label is

Linn County 4-H'ers are eligible to participate in the Silent Auction if:

- 1. They are not selling an animal in the livestock auction.
- 2. 7 years old as of May 1st.
- 3. Sign up by 3 p.m. Thursday, August 10 (sign-up sheet in 4-H Building).
- 4. Must work a shift the day of the auction (designate when signing up auction items).
- 5. May sell three items exhibited during fair; two of the three exhibits can be from the same project areas.
- 6. Must provide your auction exhibit to auction table (in Beef Barn) by 10 a.m. Saturday morning.
- 7. Attach a note card describing what your item is and any details you would like others to know.
- 8. Food items are fresh products. (Prepared in the past 24 hours.)

4-H & FFA SHOWMANSHIP RULES

1. All exhibits entering the Showmanship class will receive a ribbon. Ribbons will be awarded according to the Danish system, Blue, Red, and White. The judge will be asked to give oral comments for exhibitors.

- 2. The animals fitted and shown must be the 4-H/FFA project of the person showing the animal.
- 3. Livestock shows will be BLOW AND GO. This is defined as not using adhesive, glue, paint, or powder products.
- All showmanship classes will be divided and shown in the following order 1. Senior (14 years & Up), 2. Intermediate (11-13 years of age),
 Junior (9 & 10 years of age). 4. Beginner (7 & 8 years of age) as of January 1 of current year.
- 5. A final Showmanship Champion of overall livestock classes will be selected in the Round Robin; see Round Robin rules. (Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine)
- 6. To be eligible for the FFA Showmanship division at the Linn County Fair the FFA member must be participating in the species through a Linn County FFA Crop Program or have a current SAE agreement submitted by their Linn County FFA Advisor. FFA Showmanship will be offered in the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine. The winner of the FFA Showmanship in each of the prior mentioned species will be eligible for the Round Robin.

4-H & FFA ROUND ROBIN RULES

- 1. A champion showman will be selected in the Junior and FFA (9 & 10) Intermediate (11-13) and Senior (14 and older) age divisions from each of the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep, & Swine to participate in the Round Robin Contest. An Overall Grand Champion Round Robin Showman will be selected in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions.
- 2. Exhibitors are required to provide their champion showmanship animal for the Round Robin contest. Other animals needed will be requested by the Contest Superintendents.
- 3. The judge will provide oral comments for exhibitors.
- 4. If a showman is selected as top showman in more than one species, they must designate which species they will represent. The reserve showman in the non-selected species will be nominated to represent that species in the competition.
- 5. Exhibitors may only win the Round Robin Showmanship one time per age division.

Fabric and Fiber Arts

- 1. May enter four exhibits.
- 2. Fiber Arts articles, which are normally worn as a pair, must be exhibited as a pair.
- 3. Fiber Arts is defined as any method of creating a unique design with fiber, fabric or yarn. This may include making fabric such as weaving, crochet, knitting, needlepoint or when existing fabric is changed into something quite different, such as quilting or embroidery or ethnic art. Ethnic Fiber Arts should use a fiber, yarn or fabric to create the design exhibit. For quilted items, indicate who did the quilting and binding.
- 4. Fiber Arts Educational Notebook Share with others what you learned in this project about a particular fiber art. Exhibits should

be in the form of a notebook or binder. The notebook should include a narrative section describing the fiber art. It should include a clear description of the project, technique, budget, supplies, goals, accomplishments, successes, failures, and future plans. It may include samples of techniques, how-to photographs of completed projects, or other ways of educating others about fiber arts.

5. State Fair Special Rules: May enter three fabric and fiber art exhibits, one exhibit per class, if you receive a purple at the county fair.

- 1. Each banner, booth, or bale should illustrate or demonstrate a phase of club work or activity. Must be set up by 10 a.m. on Tuesday, August 8.
- 2. Each club may make up to 2 entries; entries must be made on pre-fair entry form.
- 3. Name of club should be in front of booth or bale. A label is to be attached to the front lower left corner of a banner with club name, county, and year.
- 4. Booths shall be 4 feet square and stand alone.
- 5. Hay bales are donated by the fair board and re-used; please do not use spray paint or other such products to decorate them with.
- 6. Club must maintain its booth or hay bale throughout fair.
- 7. Each club is responsible for disassembling their booth, bale or banner at the conclusion of fair.
- 8. Basis of Award:

A. Educational Value 40%

* Presents suggestions or striking facts or clinching arguments, simple in form, quickly grasped, and an ease of accomplishment.

* Shows extent which 4-H involvement meets a fundamental need.

* Promotes decision and action; for example yields, savings, increased returns, or other benefits which adoption of practice(s) represents. B. Interest and Originality 20%

* Presents original, unusual or striking method of exhibition. Uses life, motion, action, color or light to emphasize the main idea presented.

* Holds interest of people until they have read or observed essentials of the materials presented.

- * Uses familiar illustrative material.
- * Uses method of demonstration or simple contrast.
- * Defines clearly one central idea.
- C. Appearance 20%

* General appearance, artistic, neat and attractive.

* Title sign showing subject of exhibit.

D. Quality of display and material 20%

* Maps, labels, and charts designed to feature effectively the work of practice presented. Consider size of letters and cards in relation to importance of idea.

* Quality of products grown or articles made.

* Display must be made of materials that will permit the banner to be rolled, folded and displayed repeatedly without damaging the banner.

* Banner must be hung on a rod and rope or hanging wire which is strong enough to support the banner.

* Banner must be a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 16 square feet, with a minimum of 3 feet on one side.

9. State Fair Special Rules. A maximum of three banners may be entered per county.

Sewing Construction

a) Fabric labels may be obtained from the Extension Office: Labels must contain Name, Class Number, County or District.b) Sew or attach labels on inside of garment (back of neck, center back of waistband, or end of apron band. Label each piece.

- 3. Garments should be carefully laundered and clean before being exhibited.
- 4. Garments should be placed on hangers when brought to be judged. Attach skirts on hangers with large safety pins.
- 5. Bring pattern to judging; your ribbon placing will be lowered by one without it.
- 6. Enter quilts in Fiber Arts Project.
- 7. Educational Exhibit Classes. Share with others what you learned in this project. Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display.
