1. Every exhibit entered must have been made by a student enrolled vocational agriculture in a Linn County High School.
2. Exhibits must be pre-entered via e-mail to abbie2@ksu.edu by July 15. All exhibits are to be entered on Tuesday, August 5 from 8:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m.
3. All entries must have been grown by the exhibitor as a part of his or her supervised agricultural experience program. All exhibits must have been produced during the year specified for the class.
4. Grain and seed exhibits must be exactly one quart in each sample. Samples of incorrect size will be disqualified.
5. Each exhibit must contain a label showing exhibitor's name, chapter, kind of crop, variety and class number entered in.
6. Each ear of corn must be in its natural condition and not more than one percent of its grain missing.
7. Each exhibitor is limited to ten entries in bedding plants or houseplants. Exhibitors are limited to five entries per class in the fruits and vegetables classes.
8. Premium money will be awarded only to those members whose exhibits are brought to the fair.
9. Please refer to the Linn County Fair FFA Supplement for a complete listing of classes. This supplement can be obtained by contacting the Linn County Extension Office or your local FFA Advisor.
10. Conference judging is not required in the FFA division.

NEW LINN COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION BICYCLES AND ATV'S RULES

The Linn County Fair Association, Mound City, KS, is happy to invite the public to visit the Fair Grounds, but wants everyone to remain safe. Therefore, the Board of Directors of the Association is implementing the rules outlined below to govern what is increasingly becoming a problem: the misuse or careless use of bicycles and ATVs on the Fair Grounds.

- In the interest of safety, all bicycles and ATVs must be operated in a safe and responsible manner during the fair or any other public event.
- No bicycle riding is allowed in the barns or any buildings during the fair.
- No bicycles are allowed inside the arena perimeter fence during any night show.
- No bicycle or ATV riding will be allowed on the blacktop road between the Multi-purpose Building and the ticket office during any fair county night show.
- No bicycle or ATV riding will be allowed behind the bucking chute area during the Demolition Derby, Tractor Pull or Rodeo. The only ATVs allowed in this area during the night events are those of Fair Officials.
- Anyone observed operating a bicycle or ATV in an unsafe manner to themselves or others by a fair or 4-H official will receive a verbal warning.
- Upon receiving a Second warning, the offending individual will be required to park the bike or ATV and/or remove it from the Fair Grounds.
- Repeated violations may be deemed Trespass and may result in being banned from the Fair Grounds and/or legal action.

1. All 4-H/FFA swine exhibitors are limited to showing 2 breeding gilts and 2 market hogs. (A total of 4 head can be shown by one member.)
2. Market hogs may be barrow or gilts; any animal shown in breeding classes is not eligible for premium sale.
3. No 4-H/FFA member may enter other than the animals represented in his/her project.
4. Members will be responsible for having their swine weighed.
5. No clippers allowed in swine barn.
6. Bred and Owned Market Swine must be raised on exhibitor's farm, bred and owned by youth or family.
7. Classes will be divided and shown by weights only. If a pig is tagged with the official ear tag and weighs at fair time as a market animal, it can only be shown in the market divisions.
8. Swine show order will be breeding, showmanship (Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Beginner), market followed by bred and owned.
9. All swine exhibitors must be current on YQCA certification to exhibit.
10. The top two placings in each class will show for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion.
11. All hogs must have an official 4-H EID ear tag.
12. Breeding registration papers must be in the youth or family name by June 15.

1. All animals must be a good representation of the breed designated. Breed classification determined by superintendents. No stags or late cuts will be shown.
2. All sheep must be identified with a USDA Scrapie Tag at the time of fair weigh-in and an official 4-H EID ear tag. Call 1-866-USDA TAG.
3. All 4-H/FFA sheep exhibitors are limited to showing 3 breeding sheep and 3 market sheep. A total of 6 head can be shown by one member.
4. Animals shown in the breeding class cannot be shown in the market class and are not eligible for premium sale.
5. Sheep show order will be breeding, showmanship (Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Beginner), market followed by bred and owned. Youth must have completed YQCA to exhibit.
7. Showing of Sheep - Sheep must be shown with all four feet on the ground. Exhibitors may use collars, collars with a short lead, or halters when showing. No extreme collars (spike/training) will be allowed.
8. Breeding registration papers must be in the youth or family name by June 15.
9. All sheep must be free of signs of active fungal (ringworm) infection, including sore mouth.

Market Lamb Special Rules:

1. Classes will be divided and shown by weight ONLY.
2. Bred and Owned Class will be shown for Market Sheep only.
3. Bred and Owned must be raised on exhibitor's farm by youth or family.
4. All lambs must have their lamb teeth.

1. No 4-H/FFA member may enter other than the animals represented in his/her project.
2. No 4-H/FFA member may enter and exhibit more than two in each class.
3. All market rabbits will be judged on meat quality.
4. Each rabbit is to be legibly and permanently tattooed in its left ear for identification prior to entry at fair.
5. All rabbits will be divided into age classes (pre-junior, junior, 6-8 months, and senior) and judged according to their breed standards as listed in the ARBA "Standard of Perfection." Only breeds recognized by ARBA may be shown, with the exception of the mixed breed class.
6. The mixed breed class will be judged on conditioning and overall health. Rabbits not eligible for other classes can be shown in the mixed breed class.
7. The mixed breed class winners will not be eligible for best of breed.
8. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering rabbits daily.
9. Fur Classes - only one entry per class exhibitor and will be judged in their cages.

5. Showmanship – exhibitors in the 4-H Poultry division of showmanship will receive ribbons only.
 6. Pigeons – Exhibitor may enter 1 bird per breed as singles, not to exceed three entries.
 7. Animals may be penned according to class to streamline judging.

- Members are limited to 5 entries in each phase in which they are enrolled and they can only make entries in those classes. A member must be enrolled in the project that he or she is exhibiting.
- Judging on all classes except market poultry will be done on the basis of exhibition and production qualities. Market Poultry will be judged on meat quality.
- Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering exhibits daily.
- All poultry except waterfowl must show proof that they are Pullorum-typhoid clean by one of the following methods:

Check schedule for show times and locations.

4. Pre-entries are required to participate in the 4-H Horse Show.
5. A current Kansas 4-H Horse Identification form and a current Negative Coggins are required to check in.
6. The show order will run Senior division (14-18), Intermediate division (11-13), Junior division (9 & 10) and then Beginner division (7 & 8).
7. Horses should not be ridden east of the horse barns. Horses should be ridden in the arenas and in the parking areas next to the arenas.
8. Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Horse Superintendent.
9. Hi-Point buckles will be awarded in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions. A 4-H'er may only win one Hi-Point buckle per age division. Points will be awarded as follow:
 - Purple = 4 points • Blue = 3 points • Red = 2 points • White = 1 point.

1. Exhibit must be marked plainly with the name and address of the exhibitor by means of entry tag. (Entry tags are available at the Extension Office or Floral Hall Superintendent.)
2. Nursing home or assisted living resident participants in each class will be designated by an "N" following the class number.
3. NO exhibit which has received a prize in any previous year, shall be allowed to compete for a prize.
4. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit per class, with the exception of livestock entries.
5. All pictures and wall hangings must be able to hang unassisted with no special hardware.
6. All livestock must be typical of the breed they represent, no stags or late cuts allowed to show.
7. Check special rules for each class area. Additional classes will not be added.
8. The Superintendent's decisions are final concerning classes and eligibility within their area.
9. In all classes, or where there are one or more exhibitors, the judge reserves the right to place the entry as they see fit in regards to placing. The judge's decision is final & shall be treated with respect.
10. A Champion and Reserve Ribbon may be awarded upon judge's discretion in each of the divisions. Each division Champion winner will receive a \$5 cash prize or gift certificate provided by the Linn County Fair. Each Reserve Champion in adult division may receive a \$3 cash award from the Linnette Community Club. Each Reserve Champion in children and youth division may receive a \$3 cash award from Mine Creek Community Club. A \$10 cash prize will be added to the Adult division Champion of Floral Hall exhibits from an anonymous donor.
11. **NEW:** Cash premiums will be paid by the Linn County Fair Association and will be available from noon to 4 p.m., on Saturday, August 9 at the fair office. And then at the Linn County Extension Office from Tuesday, August 12 through Wednesday, October 1. Premium money will not be mailed out. If not picked up, all funds will be redeposited into the Linn County Fair Association account.
12. Exhibits removed or not left on the grounds until scheduled release time will forfeit ALL premium money, not just for that exhibit.
13. An exhibit or entry may only be entered in 4-H or open class, not both.
14. All items must be made by exhibitor in the past 12 months prior to judging.

11. Dog/Handler may be dismissed from the ring by the judge due to:
 - a. Dog leaving the ring out of control

 - c. Handler using abusive language or unsportsmanlike conduct
 - d. Baiting dog
12. Any dog fouling in the ring will receive an automatic white ribbon.
13. Any female dog in season will not be allowed to show.
14. In order to qualify for agility a 4-H member and their dog must complete one year of obedience training, attend 75% of the county-wide obedience training classes, and the dog must be one year of age or older at the start of training.
 - a. Agility 1A (on-lead) – All exercises on-lead. Handler and dog may be experienced or inexperienced but cannot have two qualifying scores in agility.
 - b. Agility 1B (off-lead) – All exercises off-lead. For experienced handler and dog.
 - c. Agility 2 (all off-lead) – Must have received two qualifying scores in agility.
 - d. Dogs will be divided into three height divisions for agility:
 - a. Division 1 – Dogs 14" and under
 - b. Division 2 – Dogs over 14" and including 20"
 - c. Division 3 – Dogs over 20"
15. Open Classes are open to Miami County 4-H Members who completed Linn County dog training.
16. Hi-Point – Combination of scores from each division per 4-H'er/dog combination. Hi-Point buckles can only be won one time per 4-H career. A rosette will be presented to the Hi-Point winner and can be won multiple times.

- Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks.
- The use of existing “store bought” sets for major elements of the display is not allowed. Use of figurines from sets is allowed, as is using individual bricks to create something different than the set it came from. “Store bought” sets should be considered an arts and crafts entry.
- Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks.
- You can use a partial wall or no wall, called a reveal, to show what is happening inside of a structure are acceptable, for example only having three walls to allow an unobstructed view into a room.
- Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. For example, marry-go-rounds, doors, elevators, etc. If used, judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation.
- Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Building Block Engineering Exhibit Information Form,” which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://blocks.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10” x 13” manila envelope. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items: a. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state, if appropriate operating instructions for mechanical portions of the diorama.

4. All components used in construction should be clean, free of chips, scuffs, or cracks or broken blocks.
5. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego.®

- For trailer exhibits the tongue of the trailer should have a locking mechanism (e.g. padlock) to prevent the trailer from being moved by unauthorized individuals while being displayed.
- For exhibits with downward swinging parts, such as tailgates, that could pose a fall/striking/crushing hazard should have a tamper resistant locking mechanism such as a "zip-tie" or a "cotter-key"
- Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent it from toppling over while on display.
- Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam "pool noodles" and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
- Display cases for small exhibits are acceptable and must be easily opened so the item can be removed and examined as part of judging.
- Exhibits that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that is intended to be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
- If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and lines should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires.
- Electric powered (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch.
- Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Ag Mechanics Welding Exhibit Information Form" for each exhibit, except for display boards, which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://welding.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10"x 13" manila envelope.
- Each exhibit information packet should include the following items:

1. Telescopes entered in this division may be built from a kit or by original design. Pre-finished telescopes, which require no construction, are not acceptable exhibits.
2. Telescopes are limited to no more than six feet in length. They must be placed on a stationary stand that does not allow the telescope to roll and/or fall over. The stand cannot extend past two feet in length or width.
3. Each State Fair telescope exhibit must include a "4-H Astronomy Exhibit Information Form," which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://astronomy.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.
4. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
5. At least two photographs showing telescope construction and operation are required. Photographs should be mounted on one side of an 8½" x 11" page. A brief caption should accompany each photograph. Place photos in the 10" x 13" manila envelope.

Any modifications made to the rocket except for paint scheme and decals. e. An additional page for altitude calculations if the space on the form is not enough.

f. Additionally, for original design rockets, also known as "scratch built" rockets: additional pages of photos are allowed, and include documentation of how the rocket was tested for stability.

3. Rockets are to be displayed upright on a display stand with a sturdy rod that does not extend past the top of the rocket, or stand unassisted, unless the rocket is taller than 4 feet, in which case no display stand is required and the rocket may be displayed on its side.
4. Rockets ARE NOT to be displayed with used or unused rocket engines either in the rocket or as part of the stand.
5. Rockets should be flown unless there is an active burn ban in the county or conditions are too dangerous to safely launch the rocket. Just flying the last stage (the part with the nose cone) of a multi-stage rocket is acceptable.
6. Rockets, except those in the Beginner and Junior division, are not to be "beginner kits" or use prefabricated (molded plastic) fin assemblies, or pre-finished rockets requiring no painting.
7. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
8. Each exhibit will be judged on uniqueness, creativity, neatness, accuracy of material, knowledge gained, and content. An exhibit judging score sheet available at <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/>. For example, a rocket that may have crashed and/or is highly damaged may be made into an educational display or poster that tells a great story with many lessons learned.

4-H Robotics

1. Each robot must be free-standing, without the need for additional supports in order to be moved or exhibited. Must have been constructed and/or completed during the current 4-H year.
2. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. Weight may not exceed 15 pounds.
3. All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.
4. Robots may be powered by an electrical, battery, water, air or solar source only. Junk drawer robots may be powered by a non-traditional power source. Robots powered by fossil fuels/flammable liquids will be

photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo class.

13. Appropriate photo subject matter: Photographic subject matter is expected to follow 4-H standards. For the sense of prohibited subject matter, review the Kansas 4-H member Code of Conduct; in general, if it is not allowable at a 4-H event, it is not allowable in a 4-H photograph.
14. Photos with live subjects on railroad right of way or taken from railroad right of way property will not be displayed in Kansas 4-H Photography and will be **disqualified and not judged**.
15. Copyright protections must be observed.
16. Decisions as to display and/or penalties will be made by the Photography Department Superintendent and the 4-H agent responsible for the photography department.

- To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, place mounted photo in protective plastic bag, available from the Extension Office.
- Improperly mounted photos, oversize or undersize photos with the white borders not removed or lettering (including dates) on the photo, will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judges.
- Photographs taken with a digital camera and having no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity or correction, one click filter effects, red eye removal, cropping, dodging and burning should be entered in the standard color or black.

Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the Plexiglass cover (inside, use clear double sided tape to adhere gummed labels) and by attaching a label with the same information on the lower right corner of the box (outside). The inside label is to also indicate the class number.
3. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only one of the first three geology classes. Exhibitor may also show in geology class 2258 (special exhibit) and in the lapidary class.
4. Geology specimens should be labeled with the number of the specimens, date collected, specimen name or description, and locality (county) where collected.
5. For the geology classes 2355-2357, all specimens should be mounted in the box by proper groups – rocks, minerals, fossils.
6. For geology classes 2355-2357, all specimens must be collected from locations in Kansas. Out of state specimens will not count in the minimum number for the class, or be considered in the judging.

1. Exhibits must have been preserved since the member's previous year's county fair.
2. May exhibit one entry in each class, up to 3 classes.
3. Recommended recipes and processing methods must be used. Recipes must be from current, tested resources and must be adjusted for altitude. Processing methods that will be disqualified include: open kettle canning, oven canning, sun canning and using electric multi-cookers. Untested recipes will be disqualified for food safety reasons. Obtain current recipe sources from the Extension Office.
4. Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
5. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with entry card, or it will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication and altitude of residence.
6. Exhibits must be sealed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with matching brand (ex: use Ball lids on Ball jars, or Kerr lids on Kerr jars, etc.) two piece lids. Do not use colored jars. Do not add fancy padded lids, fabric over-wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. No fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered. For food safety reasons, the size of jars used must not be larger than the jar size stated in the recipe. Note: There are 12-ounce and 24-ounce canning jars available and may be used. Use pint jar process recommendations for 12 ounce jars. Use quart jar process

5. Alcohol (ex: wine, beer and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with Alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
6. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items, such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 bread sticks, 1 loaf bread, etc.
7. Under-baked entries will be lowered one or more ribbon placings.
8. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing. The exception is for those cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.
9. Any baked product that can be removed from the pan should be placed on a plate, covered cardboard or disposable container.
10. Exhibits should be in food grade plastic bags, disposable plastic containers or boxes. Food brought in glass is acceptable, but not encouraged.
11. Educational classes: Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display. Follow copyright laws as you are preparing your exhibit. No card table displays are allowed. See 4-H General Rules for poster and display guidelines. NOTE: a collection of your favorite recipes in a recipe box or notebook does not constitute an educational exhibit.
12. State Fair Special Rule. A 4-H member may enter one entry in a non-perishable class and one entry in an educational class if they receive a purple ribbon.

- For food safety purposes: any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only. Calculation must be attached to entry or the placing will be lowered one ribbon when judged. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. 1. All 4-H / FFA exhibitors must be a valid 4-H member or current FFA Chapter member. 4-H members must be re-enrolling by January 1 and new members must be enrolled by May 1.
2. Members must be enrolled in the phase of the project in which they exhibit.
3. Exhibits must have been made or completed during the current project year (project year is October 1 of previous year thru September of current year). This includes market animals. Breeding animals are excluded because they can be brought back multiple years.
4. Pre-entries are required for ALL 4-H and FFA exhibits, as established by Marais des Cygnes District, Mound City Office. Pre-entries due **July 15**. Late entries will be accepted July 17-21 with a \$20 fee per family.
5. All animals to be housed at the fair must have a stall reservation form turned into the extension office by July 15. All stalls are pre-assigned and premium will be forfeited if changed without approval of superintendent. Stalls must be cleaned by 10 p.m. on Saturday or premium is forfeited.

6. Exhibits brought to the fair **MUST** be tagged appropriately. Entry cards will be available prior to fair.
7. Members are limited to **three entries** in each phase or division they are enrolled in, unless otherwise stated in division rules.
8. Posters may not be larger than 22" x 28".
9. Display maximum size is 3' x 4'.
10. Those in charge will assume no responsibility for exhibits left on the fairgrounds after release time.
11. **State Fair eligibility:** *Only* designated exhibits in all classes, except livestock, will be allowed to progress. *Only* Junior, Intermediate and Senior level exhibits are eligible. Limits and restrictions may apply; see each division for specific details.
12. The judge has the final authority; please treat them with respect and courtesy.
13. Age Levels:
 - a. Level I Beginner, ages 7-8 years old.
 - b. Level II Junior, ages 9-10 years old.
 - b. Level III Intermediate, ages 11-13 years old.
 - c. Level IV Senior, ages 14-18 years old.
14. Cloverbud Guidelines (Tag-A-Longs) 5-6 year olds:
 - a. Must be enrolled in Cloverbuds project.
 - b. May exhibit one project at the fair, must complete pre-fair entry form with Class as 1 (one) and fill in class description. Example: Class 1 Foods exhibit
 - c. Cloverbuds **may not** exhibit a market animal and show in competitive divisions.
 - d. May participate in the Pee Wee Show after each livestock show and Style Revue (see Clothing and Textiles section regarding script).
 - e. Will receive a "participation" ribbon and a \$1 premium. Any exhibit not left or removed before release time, will forfeit all premium money not just that exhibit.
15. All market animals must be tagged with a 4-H EID Tag in the current year. Breeding Goats, Sheep and Swine must also be tagged with a current 4-H EID.
16. All Sheep and Meat Goats must be tagged with a USDA Scrapie tag when weighed at fair. Call 1-866-USDA TAG.
17. An animal or project may only be exhibited or shown in one project area.
18. Rate of gain - to be eligible the animal must be present at the official county weigh in.
19. **NEW:** Cash premiums will be paid by the Linn County Fair Association and will be available from noon to 4 p.m., on Saturday, August 9 at the fair office. And then at the Linn County Extension Office from Tuesday, August 12 through Wednesday, October 1. Premium money will not

7. A divider page is to be placed in front of each order of insects with the order name printed on the tab for the page as well as on the front of the divider page.

Entomology Notebook Classes Guidelines

1. Individual entries are to be placed for display in a three-ring notebook for competition.
2. 4-H'ers who have been previously enrolled in or are currently enrolled in the other phases of the Entomology project need to start with the Beginning Phase of Entomology Notebooks, not the Introductory phase.
3. Each exhibitor is required to identify the notebook by placing a Title Page in the front of the notebook bearing the exhibitor's name, county or district and class 4-H'er is enrolled in and statement of taxonomy used:
 - a) "Insects in Kansas" book or
 - b) www.bugguide.net.
4. Specimen pages should be grouped according to order and should include one page per species. If more than one insect is in the photo, an arrow to indicate identified insect should be used.
5. Date, common name, full county name and state abbreviation should be included for each species. Collector's name on the specimen page is optional.
5. Specimen pages should have two different views of the insect if possible. If pictures are taken on different dates/localities, include

- be mailed out. If not picked up, all funds will be redeposited into the Linn County Fair Association account.
20. Livestock Auction money will not be available for pickup until 4 weeks after fair unless told otherwise. All outstanding bills with the Marais des Cygnes Extension Office must be paid before checks are released.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

1. A valid Linn County 4-H /FFA member in good standing can sell at the county fair premium auction during the current year regardless of species. They must show their own animal in the sale ring. Maximum of only two head per exhibitor, but only one of each species. (example: one sheep & one hog, or one beef and one hog)
2. To be sold through the sale the animal must meet the following minimum weight requirements. Animals that don't make weight cannot be base bid.
 - Meat Goats - 50 lbs. • Sheep - 95 lbs.
 - Swine - 225 lbs. • Market Heifers - 1000 lbs.
 - Market Steers - 1050 lbs.
3. Sale order will be Champion of each species, then Reserve Champion of each species, followed by Blue ribbon, Red ribbon, White ribbon animals in each designated species.
4. Anyone who violates sale rules will be barred from the sale in all species this year and any following year. They will also forfeit all premiums to be received by the fair association or sale buyers for current year on all animals including base animals.
5. All animals may be subject to a second weight for sale requirements.
6. If the owner consigns an animal to base bid to the sale and it is sold, the animal CANNOT be purchased and taken home; ownership belongs to buyer. Further the sale proceeds will be forfeited on all animals including base animals. If they mark premium only the animal can be taken home and shown at shows that allow it. All animals must sold in their natural state, meaning no grooming products.
7. 4-H / FFA animals will be sold by premium dollar.

8. All salesmen must have a current YQCA Certification **prior to June 15th** to participate in the Livestock Auction or to sell base bid animals.
9. All animals must have a livestock Auction Entry Form filled out and fees turned into the Fair Office in the Ag Building.
10. 4-H / FFA member must return one of the sheets with the buyer signature to the Auction Secretary before premiums can be paid to them.
11. Sale sign-up will be at the Fair Office during fair week.
12. **Deadline to sign up is Noon on Thursday, August 7.**
13. Late entries will be sold at the end of their respected species. Must contact Fair Office for Sale Chairman approval.
14. In accordance with the tax laws, exhibitors will receive a 1099 from the Linn County Livestock auction if their premium meets or exceeds the required amount set by current tax laws. Exhibitors selling must provide their social security number or tax ID prior to issuing any premium winnings. Youth participating in the Linn County Livestock Auction will need to provide their social security number and all information is confidential. Please consult your tax advisor on filing procedures.

4-H SILENT AUCTION

Saturday, August 9 • 10 a.m. - Noon • Beef Barn

Linn County 4-H'ers are eligible to participate in the Silent Auction if:

1. They are not selling an animal in the livestock auction.
2. 7 years old as of May 1st.
3. Sign up by 3 p.m. Thursday, August 7 (sign-up sheet in 4-H Building).
4. Must work a shift the day of the auction (designate when signing up auction items).
5. May sell three items exhibited during fair; two of the three exhibits can be from the same project areas.
6. Must provide your auction exhibit to auction table (in Beef Barn) by 10 a.m. Saturday morning.
7. Attach a note card describing what your item is and any details you would like others to know.
8. Food items are fresh products. (Prepared in the past 24 hours.)

4-H & FFA SHOWMANSHIP RULES

1. All exhibits entering the Showmanship class will receive a ribbon. Ribbons will be awarded according to the Danish system, Blue, Red, and White. The judge will be asked to give oral comments for exhibitors.
2. The animals fitted and shown must be the 4-H/FFA project of the person showing the animal.

6. Two labels should be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/locality. Full county name and state abbreviation should be on the second label. Collector's name (or host) on the date/locality label is optional.
7. The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Please refer to "Entomology Collection Exhibit Resource" for full details on out-of-state insects in collections.
8. Only specimens of the class Insecta should be included.
9. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
10. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest of the collection if they become loose in transit.

2159	INTRODUCTORY COLLECTION Display in one or two shoe boxes, pencil boxes, plastic storage boxes or one standard display box a minimum of 15 and a maximum of 30 species representing at least 6 orders. The boxes should be covered with a piece of cellophane wrap, clear plastic lid, or plexiglass taped across the top of the box or covering the box. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Members may exhibit in this class for a maximum of 2 years once they become a 4-H member. There is no Kansas State Fair class for this level.
2160	BEGINNING I ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION Display in one standard box a minimum of 50 and maximum of 125 species representing at least 7 orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first.
2161	BEGINNING II ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION Display in one standard box a minimum of 75 and maximum of 150 species representing at least 9 orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first.
2162	INTERMEDIATE ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION Display a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 300 species representing at least 10 orders. Two standard boxes can be used.

Class	4-H Small Engines
2151	Display: Exhibit a display, selecting one of the following options: 1) a display identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts; OR 2) a display identifying and explaining the function(s) of different special tools needed for small engine work; OR 3) a display illustrating and providing the results of any one of experiments that are included in the project books. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chain saws are permitted for display.
2152	Maintenance: Exhibit a display that illustrates either: 1) Routine maintenance procedures OR 2) Diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems in an engine. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chain saws, etc. are permitted for display.
2153	Operation: Exhibit an operable small engine overhauled or rebuilt by the member. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine.

Entomology Collection Classes Guidelines

1. All entries should be submitted in an 18 x 24 x 3.5 inch wooden display box with a clear plastic top (such as Plexiglas). Boxes can be handmade or purchased as long as they are of the correct size.
2. 4-H members may choose to use one of two taxonomies:
 - Option A: As printed in "Insects in Kansas" book, or
 - Option B: which follows www.bugguide.net.
3. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box with two identification labels bearing exhibitor's name, county or district and the class the 4-H'er is enrolled in and the statement of taxonomy used. One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other on the lower right corner of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so the box can be displayed lengthwise.
4. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on both of the exhibitor's box identification labels. Only one adult insect per specimens can be used in Collection Boxes and Notebook Classes, unless labeled as male or female and correctly identified.
5. Arrange specimens in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Specimens are to be arranged by Order in the box, then Family where required.

3. An exhibitor must show in breeding or marketing to be eligible to show in Showmanship. Showmanship animal must be exhibited in breeding or marketing.
4. All showmanship classes will be divided and shown in the following order 1. Senior (14 years & Up), 2. Intermediate (11-13 years of age), 3. Junior (9 & 10 years of age). 4. Beginner (7 & 8 years of age) as of January 1 of current year.
5. A final Showmanship Champion of overall livestock classes will be selected in the Round Robin; see Round Robin rules. (Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine)
6. To be eligible for the FFA Showmanship division at the Linn County Fair the FFA member must be participating in the species through a Linn County FFA Crop Program or have a current SAE agreement submitted by their Linn County FFA Advisor. FFA Showmanship will be offered in the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine. The winner of the FFA Showmanship in each of the prior mentioned species will be eligible for the Round Robin.

4-H & FFA FITTING RULES

1. All exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals throughout the fair. Grooming at the Linn County Fair for the breeding and market animal shows may include the use of adhesives, paints, and powders and shall not include the use of hair not from the animal being groomed or twine/artificial material.
2. Immediate family members (to include parents, legal guardians, siblings, aunts/uncles, and grandparents), Club Leaders/FFA Advisors and current Kansas 4-H or FFA members in good standing may provide grooming and/or care to livestock projects, regardless of if the exhibitor is present while such grooming and/or care is being provided. Once animals have arrived at the fair the fitting rules go into effect.
3. Exhibitors in violation of the rules will be warned once by Extension Staff, Fair board or Show Managers. Upon the second violation, the exhibitor may be disqualified.

Additional Fitting Rules:

4. Market Lambs - At the time of check-in, all market lambs must be "slick shorn" with uniform wool length not to exceed .20 inch from the knee and hock joints, including the head. No belly wool allowed.
5. Breeding Lambs - No belly wool allowed. Registered ewes - shearing and fitting will be based on a breed association standard.
6. Market Goats - At time of check-in, all meat goats must be "slick shorn" with uniform hair length not to exceed 3/8" inch from the knee and hock joints, head and belly excluded. If horned, the horns must be tipped.

7. Breeding Goats - Length of hair is left up to the exhibitor.
8. No aerosols are allowed in the make up area.
9. No clippers in the swine barn.
10. All animals going through the sale must be taken through in their natural state, meaning no grooming products.

4-H & FFA ROUND ROBIN RULES

1. A champion showman will be selected in the Junior (9 & 10) Intermediate (11-13) and Senior and FFA (14 and older) age divisions from each of the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep, & Swine to participate in the Round Robin Contest. An Overall Grand Champion Round Robin Showman will be selected in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions.
2. Exhibitors are required to provide their champion showmanship animal for the Round Robin contest. Other animals needed will be requested by the Contest Superintendents.
3. The judge will provide oral comments for exhibitors.
4. If a showman is selected as top showman in more than one species, they must designate which species they will represent. The reserve showman in the non-selected species will be nominated to represent that species in the competition.
5. Exhibitors may only win the Round Robin Showmanship one time per age division. Senior and FFA are considered the same age division and no cross over is allowed after winning one division.

Visual Arts and Crafts

1. May enter up to four exhibits.
2. It is recommended to attach a 3x5 index card describing where you got the idea and what you did to make it your own. This **must** be attached to be eligible for State Fair Selection.
3. Exhibitor is welcome to bring a picture stand, if needed, for display.
3. No plants or plant materials needing watering can be entered.
4. State Fair Special Rules: Each county may submit one entry from five categories: Fine Arts, Clay and Ceramics, Leather and Jewelry, Three-Dimensional, and General Crafts. Only original designs will be allowed. Exhibitors should avoid using copyrighted materials whenever possible by originating his/her own work.

4. Any project with a complexity of size or electronics must have (1) Instructions for assembly and use (2) Equipment available at the time of judging for actual testing of the exhibit.
5. Small engines exhibits must be smaller than 20 horsepower. Displays are limited to 4' wide and 4' deep.
6. No hand dipped solder may be used.

Fabric and Fiber Arts

1. May enter four exhibits.
2. Fiber Arts articles, which are normally worn as a pair, must be exhibited as a pair.
3. Fiber Arts is defined as any method of creating a unique design with fiber, fabric or yarn. This may include making fabric such as weaving, crochet, knitting, needlepoint or when existing fabric is changed into something quite different, such as quilting or embroidery or ethnic art. Ethnic Fiber Arts should use a fiber, yarn or fabric to create the design exhibit. For quilted items, indicate who did the quilting and binding.
4. Fiber Arts Educational Notebook — Share with others what you learned in this project about a particular fiber art. Exhibits should be in the form of a notebook or binder. The notebook should include a narrative section describing the fiber art. It should include a clear description of the project, technique, budget, supplies, goals, accomplishments, successes, failures, and future plans. It may include samples of techniques, how-to photographs of completed projects, or other ways of educating others about fiber arts.
5. State Fair Special Rules: May enter three fabric and fiber art exhibits, one exhibit per class, if you receive a purple at the county fair.

- Each banner, booth, or bale should illustrate or demonstrate a phase of club work or activity. Must be set up by 10 a.m. on Tuesday, August 6.
- Each club may make up to 2 entries; entries must be made on pre-fair entry form.
- Name of club should be in front of booth or bale. A label is to be attached to the front lower left corner of a banner with club name, county, and year.
- Booths shall be 4 feet square and stand alone.
- Hay bales are donated by the fair board and re-used; please do not use spray paint or other such products to decorate them with.
- Club must maintain its booth or hay bale throughout fair.
- Each club is responsible for disassembling their booth, bale or banner at the conclusion of fair.
- Basis of Award:
 - Educational Value 40%
 - Presents suggestions or striking facts or clinching arguments, simple in form, quickly grasped, and an ease of accomplishment.
 - Shows extent which 4-H involvement meets a fundamental need.
 - Promotes decision and action; for example yields, savings, increased returns, or other benefits which adoption of practice(s) represents.
 - Interest and Originality 20%
 - Presents original, unusual or striking method of exhibition. Uses life, motion, action, color or light to emphasize the main idea presented.
 - Holds interest of people until they have read or observed essentials of the materials presented.
 - Uses familiar illustrative material.
 - Uses method of demonstration or simple contrast.
 - Defines clearly one central idea.
 - Appearance 20%
 - * General appearance, artistic, neat and attractive.
 - * Title sign showing subject of exhibit.
 - Quality of display and material 20%
 - Maps, labels, and charts designed to feature effectively the work of practice presented. Consider size of letters and cards in relation to importance of idea.
 - Quality of products grown or articles made.
 - Display must be made of materials that will permit the banner to be rolled, folded and displayed repeatedly without damaging the banner.
 - Banner must be hung on a rod and rope or hanging wire which is

strong enough to support the banner.

- Banner must be a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 16 square feet, with a minimum of 3 feet on one side.

- State Fair Special Rules. A maximum of three banners may be entered per county.

 - Sew or attach labels on inside of garment (back of neck, center back of waistband, or end of apron band. Label each piece.
- Garments should be carefully laundered and clean before being exhibited.
- Garments should be placed on hangers when brought to be judged. Attach skirts on hangers with large safety pins.
- Bring pattern to judging; your ribbon placing will be lowered by one without it.
- Enter quilts in Fiber Arts Project.
- Pre-cut kits are acceptable for all clothing classes. All articles/garments must be finished for use.
- Educational Exhibit Classes. Share with others what you learned in this project. Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display. Follow Copyright laws as you are preparing your exhibit. No card table displays are allowed. (See General Rules for poster and display guidelines.)
- 4-Hers will be notified if their construction project won an award s they can attend the Public Revue, that evening, to receive their award.
- State Fair Special Rules. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two exhibits in Sewing Construction, must be in two different classes.
