NEW LINN COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION BICYCLES AND ATV'S RULES

The Linn County Fair Association, Mound City, KS, is happy to invite the public to visit the Fair Grounds, but wants everyone to remain safe. Therefore, the Board of Directors of the Association is implementing the rules outlined below to govern what is increasingly becoming a problem: the misuse or careless use of bicycles and ATVs on the Fair Grounds.

- In the interest of safety, all bicycles and ATVs must be operated in a safe and responsible manner during the fair or any other public event.
- No bicycle riding is allowed in the barns or any buildings during the fair.
- No bicycles are allowed inside the arena perimeter fence during any night show.
- No bicycle or ATV riding will be allowed on the blacktop road between the Multi-purpose Building and the ticket office during any fair county night show.
- No bicycle or ATV riding will be allowed behind the bucking chute area during the Demolition Derby, Tractor Pull or Rodeo. The only ATVs allowed in this area during the night events are those of Fair Officials.
- Anyone observed operating a bicycle or ATV in an unsafe manner to themselves or others by a fair or 4-H official will receive a verbal warning.
- Upon receiving a Second warning, the offending individual will be required to park the bike or ATV and/or remove it from the Fair Grounds.
- Repeated violations may be deemed Trespass and may result in being banned from the Fair Grounds and/or legal action.

 - b. Present evidence (documentation) that the entries were purchased from a U.S. Pullorum-typhoid clean source and have been the only poultry on the premises.
 - c. Present an official VS 9-2 Form, signed by an official testing agent, showing the entries have had a negative Pullorum-typhoid test within the preceding 90 days. Failure to do so will be immediate removal from fairgrounds.
- 5. Showmanship exhibitors in the 4-H Poultry division of showmanship will receive ribbons only.
- 6. Pigeons Exhibitor may enter 1 bird per breed as singles, not to exceed three entries.
- 7. Animals <u>may</u> be penned according to class to streamline judging.

- 1. The Linn County Fair Horse Show will follow the rules stated in the Kansas 4-H Horse Rule Book.
- 2. Each 4-H horse being entered in the 4-H Horse Show must be registered with the Extension Office prior to June 1 of the current year. Multiple family members may use the same horse, but the management of the project should be split equally between family members. A horse may not be entered in the same class more than one time in the same age division.
- 3. All horse entries are due on the Fairgrounds Sunday by 4 p.m. Check schedule for show times and locations.
- 4. Pre-entries are required to participate in the 4-H Horse Show.
- 5. A current Kansas 4-H Horse Identification form and a current Negative Coggins are required to check in.
- 6. The show order will run Senior division (14-18), Intermediate division (11-13), Junior division (9 & 10) and then Beginner division (7 & 8).
- 7. Horses should not be ridden east of the horse barns. Horses should be ridden in the arenas and in the parking areas next to the arenas.
- 8. Please submit a Stall Reservation Form by July 15 and the Horse Superintendent will assign stalls, if you wish to stall during fair.
- 9. Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Horse Superintendent.
- 10. Hi-Point buckles will be awarded in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions. A 4-H'er may only win one Hi-Point buckle per age division. Complete High Point Rules are available on request.
- 11. A horse can only show in one Western Pleasure Class.

OPEN CLASS GENERAL RULES

- 1. Exhibit must be marked plainly with the name and address of the exhibitor by means of entry tag. (Entry tags are available at the Extension Office or Floral Hall Superintendent.)
- 2. Nursing home or assisted living resident participants in each class will be designated by an "N" following the class number.
- 3. NO exhibit which has received a prize in any previous year, shall be allowed to compete for a prize.
- 4. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit per class, with the exception of livestock entries.
- 5. All pictures and wall hangings must be able to hang unassisted with no special hardware.
- All livestock must be typical of the breed they represent, no stags or late cuts allowed to show.
- 7. Check special rules for each class area. Additional classes will not be added.
- 8. The Superintendent's decisions are final concerning classes and eligibility within their area.
- In all classes, or where there are one or more exhibitors, the judge reserves the right to place the entry as they see fit in regards to placing. The judge's decision is final & shall be treated with respect.
- 10. A Champion and Reserve Ribbon may be awarded upon judge's discretion in each of the divisions. Each division Champion winner will receive a \$5 cash prize or gift certificate provided by the Linn County Fair Association. Each Reserve Champion in adult division may receive a \$3 cash award from the Linnette Community Club. Each Reserve Champion in children and youth division may receive a \$3 cash award from Mine Creek Community Club. A \$10 cash prize will be added to the Adult division Champion of Floral Hall exhibits from an anonymous donor.
- 11. Premiums will be paid by the Linn County Fair Association and will be ready to pick up at the Linn County Extension Office on Monday, August 22 following the fair. Premium money will not be mailed out. Premium money not picked up by October 1 will be redeposited into the Linn County Fair Association account.
- 12. Exhibits removed or not left on the grounds until scheduled release time will forfeit ALL premium money, not just for that exhibit.
- 13. An exhibit or entry may only be entered in 4-H or open class, not both.

- 1. The "Guidelines to Kansas 4-H Dog Show" will be the rules for show in all classes except the Beginner (pre-novice) Obedience Classes.
- 2. Obedience must be completed to participate in any other division.
- 3. To participate at the Linn County Fair and Linn County Dog Club Spring Show, the 4-H member and their dog must complete 75% of the meetings. This is for each division, not as a whole year.
- 4. New members that join after the May 1 deadline, who have missed meetings that occurred prior to May 1 will only be able to participate in showmanship at the Linn County Fair and Spring Show.
- 5. The dog must be trained and shown by a 4-H member.
- 6. A current immunization record by a licensed veterinarian must be presented at check-in.
- 7. May exhibit only in one Obedience Class per dog.
- 8. May exhibit only in one Showmanship Class per dog. Showmanship will be divided according to the handler's age.
- 9. Dogs must be shown with a 6' leather or nylon lead and training collar in Obedience Classes.
- 10. Dress Code Showmanship Slacks, jeans with no holes, dresses, polo shirts, blazer/jacket, button down shirt, business attire. (No shorts, open toe shoes, Crocs, tank tops or casual clothing.)
- 11. Dog/Handler may be dismissed from the ring by the judge due to:
 - a. Dog leaving the ring out of control
 - b. Dog being overly aggressive
 - c. Handler using abusive language or unsportsmanlike conduct d. Baiting dog
- 12. Any dog fouling in the ring will receive an automatic white ribbon.
- 13. Any female dog in season will not be allowed to show.
- 14. In order to qualify for agility a 4-H member and their dog must complete one year of obedience training, attend 75% of the county-wide obedience training classes, and the dog must be one year of age or older at the start of training.
 - a. Agility 1A (on-lead) All exercises on-lead. Handler and dog may be experienced or inexperienced but cannot have two qualifying scores in agility.
 - b. Agility 1B (off-lead) All exercises off-lead. For experienced handler and dog.
 - c. Agility 2 (all off-lead) Must have received two qualifying scores in agility.
 - d. Dogs will be divided into three height divisions for agility:
 - a. Division 1 Dogs 14" and under b. Division 2 Dogs over 14" an

- 4. All components used in construction should be clean, free of chips, scuffs, or cracks or broken blocks.
- 5. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®
- 6. Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks.
- 7. The use of existing "store bought" sets for major elements of the display is <u>not</u> allowed. Use of figurines from sets is allowed, as is using individual bricks to create something different than the set it came from. "Store bought" sets should be considered an arts and crafts entry.
- 8. Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks.
- 9. You can use a partial wall or no wall, called a reveal, to show what is happening inside of a structure are acceptable, for example only having three walls to allow an unobstructed view into a room.
- 10. Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. For example, marry-gorounds, doors, elevators, etc. If used, judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation.
- 11. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H Building Block Engineering Exhibit Information Form," which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at http://blocks.engtech4ks.com/. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items: a. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state, if appropriate operating instructions for mechanical portions of the diorama.

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been constructed or repaired during the current 4-H year
- Wheeled exhibits must utilize a braking mechanism which prevents
 the exhibit from freely rolling while on display. Exhibitors are
 responsible for providing sufficient braking or "chocks" for trailer
 exhibits to ensure that the exhibits do not move once positioned.
- 3. For trailer exhibits the tongue of the trailer should have a locking mechanism (e.g. padlock) to prevent the trailer from being moved by unauthorized individuals while being displayed.
- 4. For exhibits with downward swinging parts, such as tailgates, that could pose a fall/striking/crushing hazard should have a tamper resistant locking mechanism such as a "zip-tie" or a "cotter-key."
- 5. Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent it from toppling over while on display.
- Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam "pool noodles" and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
- 7. Display cases for small exhibits are acceptable and must be easily opened so the item can be removed and examined as part of judging.
- 8. Exhibits that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that is intended to be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
- 9. If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and lines should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires.
- 10. Electric powered (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch.
- 11. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Ag Mechanics Welding Exhibit Information Form" for each exhibit, except for display

4-H Robotics

- 1. Each robot must be free-standing, without the need for additional supports in order to be moved or exhibited. Must have been constructed and/or completed during the current 4-H year.
- 2. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. Weight may not exceed 15 pounds.
- All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.
- 4. Robots may be powered by an electrical, battery, water, air or solar source only. Junk drawer robots may be powered by a non-traditional power source. Robots powered by fossil fuels/flammable liquids will be disqualified. Robots that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified.
- 5. Remote controlled robots are allowed under certain conditions provided that the robot is not drivable. Remote controlled cars, boats, planes and/or action figures, etc. are not allowed.
- 6. Each robot must be in operable working condition. The judges will operate each robot to evaluate its workmanship.
- 7. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Robotics Exhibit Information Form" which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at http://robotics.engtech4ks.com/ This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.

Astronomy

- Telescopes entered in this division may be built from a kit or by original design. Pre-finished telescopes, which require no construction, are not acceptable exhibits.
- 2. Telescopes are limited to no more than six feet in length. They must be placed on a stationary stand that does not allow the telescope to roll and/or fall over. The stand cannot extend past two feet in length or width.
- 3. Each State Fair telescope exhibit must include a "4-H Astronomy Exhibit Information Form," which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at http://astronomy.engtech4ks.com/. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.
- 4. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these

4-H Rocketry

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter up to two rocket exhibits that have been constructed during the current year. An exhibitor may <u>not</u> enter two rockets in the same class.
- 2. 4-Hers are to complete and sign the rocketry information form, available from http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/ or your local extension office and attach it to a 10" x 13""manila" envelope. The envelope should contain: a. Instructions on how to construct the rocket. b. Up to 5 pages of pictures, pictures are to be attached to sheets of paper, from both construction and launch. c. Documentation of any flight damage that occurred. d. Any modifications made to the rocket except for paint scheme and decals. e. An additional page for altitude calculations if the space on the form is not enough. f. Additionally, for original design rockets, also known as "scratch built" rockets: additional pages of photos are allowed, and include documentation of how the rocket was tested for stability.
- 3. Rockets are to be displayed upright on a display stand with a sturdy rod that does not extend past the top of the rocket, or stand unassisted, unless the rocket is taller than 4 feet, in which case no display stand is required and the rocket may be displayed on its side.
- 4. Rockets ARE NOT to be displayed with used or unused rocket engines either in the rocket or as part of the stand.
- Rockets should be flown unless there is an active burn ban in the county or conditions are too dangerous to safely launch the rocket. Just flying the last stage (the part with the nose cone) of a multi-stage rocket is acceptable.
- Rockets, except those in the Beginner and Junior division, are not to be "beginner kits" or use prefabricated (molded plastic) fin assemblies, or pre-finished rockets requiring no painting.
- 7. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for thes exhibits.
- 8. Each exhibit will be judged on uniqueness, creativity, neatness, accuracy of material, knowledge gained, and content. An exhibit judging score sheet available at http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/. For example, a rocket that may have crashed and/or is highly damaged may be made into an educational display or poster that tells a great story with many lessons learned.

- 1. The standard size exhibit box should be 18" x 24" x 3 ½". All specimens are to be arranged across the narrow (18") dimension of the exhibit box, making the exhibit 18" across the top and 24" deep. Exhibit box should have a sliding Plexiglass cover, so it can be removable from the top. Screws, locks, or other devices that would prevent judges from removing Plexiglass cover should not be used.
- 2. Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the Plexiglass cover (inside, use clear double sided tape to adhere gummed labels) and by attaching a label with the same information on the lower right corner of the box (outside). The inside label is to also indicate the class number.
- 3. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only one of the first three geology classes. Exhibitor may also show in geology class 2258 (special exhibit) and in the lapidary class.

(Magnetic or adhesive filler sheets for photographic prints or sheet protectors are recommended.) Twigs and fruit collections may be exhibited in whatever manner you choose. Resources for exhibiting are located on the Kansas 4-H forestry project webpage

- 2. Name, club, age, and year in project should be on front cover or in a prominent location.
- 3. Leaves should be identified with an appropriate label located near the leaf on the same page. These labels should include (1) The proper common name as listed in the 4H334, "List of Native Kansas Forest Trees" 2) Location (city and/or county) where collected; and (3) date (day, month, year) or (month, day, year) collected.
- 4. Divide specimens into the following two sections: Native Kansas Trees, and Non-Native Trees.
- 5. New specimens are those specimens collected during the current 4-H year and cannot be a duplicate tree species of previously displayed specimens.
- 6. Group specimens according to the years collected (ex. "old-previous years" and "new").
- 7. Variations of varieties do not count as different species or specimens.
- 8. In all leaf collections, exhibit one complete leaf where possible. If leaf is too large, exhibit as much as possible. Sketch in reduced scale the entire leaf and illustrate where the exhibited portion is from. Note: A "leaflet" is incorrect when displayed as the complete leaf for the tree.

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- 3. Recommended recipes and processing methods must be used. Recipes must be from current, tested resources and must be adjusted for altitude. Processing methods that will be disqualified include: open kettle canning, oven canning, sun canning and using electric multi-cookers. Untested recipes will be disqualified for food safety reasons. Obtain current recipe sources from the Extension Office.
- 4. Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
- 5. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with entry card, or it will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication and altitude of residence.
- 6. Exhibits must be sealed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with matching brand (ex: use Ball lids on Ball jars, or Kerr lids on Kerr jars, etc.) two piece lids. Do not use colored jars. Do not add fancy padded lids, fabric over-wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. No fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered. For food safety reasons, the size of jars used must not be larger than the jar size stated in the recipe. Note: There are 12-ounce and 24-ounce canning jars available and may be used. Use pint jar process recommendations for 12 ounce jars. Use quart jar process recommendations for 24 ounce jars.
- 7. Each jar exhibit must be labeled. The label must not cover brand name of jar. The label must give: Class No, Product Altitude of Residence, Canning Method (water bath weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), Process Time Pressure (psi), Date Processed including month and year, Name and County/District. Labels may be picked up from the Extension Office.
- 8. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 1/2 cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. All meat jerky must be cooked to an internal temperature of 160° F before or after drying. Dried products must include the recipe and preparation steps. Jerky not heated to an internal temperature of 160° F will be disqualified and not be judged.

- 2. Present to judge a recipe card with ingredients and instructions for each food exhibit, or the placing will be lowered one ribbon when judged.
- 3. For food safety purposes, any food with custard and dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex. cream cheese), raw eggs, flavored oils, "canned" bread or cakes in a jar, cut fresh fruit or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. bacon) or unbaked exhibit with raw flour (ex. no bake cookies) will be disqualified and not judged.
- 4. For food safety purposes: any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only. Calculation must be attached to entry or will be lowered one ribbon placing. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples on how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at:
 - https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf.
- 5. Alcohol (ex: wine, beer and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with Alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
- 6. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items, such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 bread sticks, 1 loaf bread, etc.
- 7. Under-baked entries will be lowered one or more ribbon placings.
- 8. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing. The exception is for those cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.
- 9. Any baked product that can be removed from the pan should be placed on a plate, covered cardboard or disposable container.
- 10. Exhibits should be in food grade plastic bags, disposable plastic containers or boxes.
- 11. Educational classes: Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display. Follow copyright laws as you are preparing your exhibit. No card table displays are allowed. See 4-H General Rules for poster and display guidelines. NOTE: a collection of your favorite recipes in a recipe

- 4. Pre-entries are required for ALL 4-H and FFA exhibits, as established by Marais des Cygnes District, Mound City Office. Pre-entries due **July 15**. Late entries will be accepted July 17-21 with a \$20 fee per family.
- 5. All animals to be housed at the fair must have a stall reservation form turned into the extension office by July 15.
- 6. Exhibits brought to the fair MUST be tagged appropriately. Entry cards will be available prior to fair.
- 7. Members are limited to **three entries** in each phase or division they are enrolled in, unless otherwise stated in division rules.
- 8. Posters may not be larger than 22" x 28".
- 9. Display maximum size is 3' x 4'.
- 10. Those in charge will assume no responsibility for exhibits left on the fairgrounds after release time.
- 11. **State Fair eligibility:** *Only* designated exhibits in all classes, except livestock, will be allowed to progress. *Only* Junior, Intermediate and Senior level exhibits are eligible. Limits and restrictions may apply; see each division for specific details.
- 12. The judge has the final authority; please treat them with respect and courtesy.
- 13. Age Levels:
 - a. Level I Beginner, ages 7-8 years old.
 - b. Level II Junior, ages 9-10 years old.
 - b. Level III Intermediate, ages 11-13 years old.
 - c. Level IV Senior, ages 14-18 years old.

ENTOMOLOGY EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY CLASSES GUIDELINES

- 1. If the exhibit is a wooden box, it must be a 18x24x3.5 inch wooden display box with a clear plastic top (such as Plexiglass). Boxes can be handmade or purchased as long as they are of the correct size. Arrange display in the box so the box can be displayed lengthwise.
- Displays should be presented in a clear, concise, and interesting manner.
- 3. Displays should include only work performed during the current year.
- 4. The purpose of the project is to learn more about the importance, life cycles, biology, ecology, diversity, etc., of insects and related arthropods. Subject matter can be as varied as the animals themselves.

If the exhibitor has been in the same class for more than one year, a separate sheet of paper needs to be added stating how many years the exhibitor has been in this class of the project and what the exhibitor did this year to improve their notebook. Place the paper just behind the Title Page in the front of the notebook.
- 10. A special project must be completed each year and included in the notebook. See project guideline materials for specifications.

- 25. Grooming stands are allowed on the edges in new sheep and goat barn addition, not in the alleys.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

- 1. A valid Linn County 4-H /FFA member in good standing can sell at the county fair premium auction during the current year regardless of species. They must show their own animal in the sale ring. Maximum of only two head per exhibitor, but only one of each species. (example: one sheep & one hog, or one beef and one hog)
- 2. To be sold through the sale the animal must meet the following minimum weight requirements. Animals that don't make weight cannot be base bid.

Meat Goats - 50 lbs. • Sheep - 95 lbs.

Swine - 225 lbs. • Market Heifers - 1000 lbs.

Market Steers - 1050 lbs.

- 3. Sale order will be Champion of each species, then Reserve Champion of each species, followed by Blue ribbon, Red ribbon, White ribbon animals in each designated species.
- 4. Anyone who violates sale rules will be barred from the sale in all

- species this year and any following year. They will also forfeit all premiums to be received by the fair association or sale buyers for current year on all animals including base animals.
- 5. All animals may be subject to a second weight for sale requirements.
- 6. If the owner consigns an animal to base bid to the sale and it is sold, the animal CANNOT be purchased and taken home; ownership belongs to buyer. Further the sale proceeds will be forfeited on all animals including base animals. If they mark premium only the animal can be taken home and shown at shows that allow it.
- 7. 4-H / FFA animals will be sold by premium dollar.
- 8. All salesmen must have a current YQCA Certification **prior to June 15th** to participate in the Livestock Auction or to sell base bid animals.
- 9. All animals being sold must have a livestock Auction Entry Form filled out and fees turned into the Fair Office in the Ag Building.
- 10. 4-H / FFA member must return one of the sheets with the buyer signature to the Auction Secretary before premiums can be paid to them.
- 11. Sale sign-up will be at the Fair Office during fair week.
- 12. Deadline to sign up is Noon on Thursday, August 8.
- 13. Late entries will be sold at the end of their respected species. Must contact Fair Office for Sale Chairman approval.
- 14. In accordance with the tax laws, exhibitors will receive a 1099 from the Linn County Livestock auction if their premium meets or exceeds the required amount set by current tax laws. Exhibitors selling must provide their social security number or tax ID prior to issuing any premium winnings. Youth participating in the Linn County Livestock Auction will need to provide their social security number and all information is confidential. Please consult your tax advisor on filing procedures.

Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years.

ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK CLASSES GUIDELINES

- Individual entries are to be placed for display in a three-ring notebook for competition.
- 2. 4-H'ers who have been previously enrolled in or are currently enrolled in the other phases of the Entomology project need to start with the Beginning Phase of Entomology Notebooks, not the Introductory phase.
- 3. Each exhibitor is required to identify the notebook by placing a Title Page in the front of the notebook bearing the exhibitor's name, county or district and class 4-H'er is enrolled in and statement of taxonomy used:
 - a) "Insects in Kansas" book or

One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other on the lower right corner of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.
- 4. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on both of the exhibitor's box identification labels. Only adult specimens can be used in collection boxes; however one female and one male of a species correctly identified can be displayed.
- 5. Arrangement of specimens: The preferred method is to arrange the insects in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Specimens are to be arranged by order in the box, then family where required.
- 6. Two labels should be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/locality. Full county name and state abbreviation should be on the second label. Collector's name (or host) on the date/locality label is optional.
- The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Please refer to "Entomology Collection Exhibit Resource" for full details on out-of-state insects in collections.
- 8. Only specimens of the class Insecta should be included.
- 9. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest of the collection if they become loose in transit.
- 10. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
- 11. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest

4-H & FFA SHOWMANSHIP RULES

- 1. All exhibits entering the Showmanship class will receive a ribbon. Ribbons will be awarded according to the Danish system, Blue, Red, and White. The judge will be asked to give oral comments for exhibitors.
- 2. The animals fitted and shown must be the 4-H/FFA project of the person showing the animal.
- 3. Livestock shows will be BLOW AND GO. This is defined as not using adhesive, glue, paint, or powder products.
- All showmanship classes will be divided and shown in the following order 1. Senior (14 years & Up), 2. Intermediate (11-13 years of age), 3. Junior (9 & 10 years of age).
 Beginner (7 & 8 years of age) as of January 1 of current year.
- 5. A final Showmanship Champion of overall livestock classes will be selected in the Round Robin; see Round Robin rules. (Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine)
- 6. To be eligible for the FFA Showmanship division at the Linn County Fair the FFA member must be participating in the species through a Linn County FFA Crop Program or have a current SAE agreement submitted by their Linn County FFA Advisor. FFA Showmanship will be offered in the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine. The winner of the FFA Showmanship in each of the prior mentioned species will be eligible for the Round Robin.

4-H & FFA ROUND ROBIN RULES

- A champion showman will be selected in the Junior (9 & 10)
 Intermediate (11-13) and Senior and FFA (14 and older) age divisions
 from each of the following species: Beef, Goat, Sheep, & Swine to

- C. Appearance 20%
- * General appearance, artistic, neat and attractive.
- * Title sign showing subject of exhibit.
- D. Quality of display and material 20%
- * Maps, labels, and charts designed to feature effectively the work of practice presented. Consider size of letters and cards in relation to importance of idea.
- * Quality of products grown or articles made.
- * Display must be made of materials that will permit the banner to be rolled, folded and displayed repeatedly without damaging the banner.
- * Banner must be hung on a rod and rope or hanging wire which is strong enough to support the banner.
- * Banner must be a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 16 square feet, with a minimum of 3 feet on one side.
- 9. State Fair Special Rules. A maximum of three banners may be entered per county.

Sewing Construction

- 1. May exhibit up to four entries in your level.
- 2. Identification Labels (no straight pins may be used to attach these items.)
 - a) Fabric labels may be obtained from the Extension Office: Labels must contain Name, Class Number, County or District.
 - b) Sew or attach labels on inside of garment (back of neck, center back of waistband, or end of apron band. Label each piece.
- 3. Garments should be carefully laundered and clean before being

- exhibited.
- 4. Garments should be placed on hangers when brought to be judged. Attach skirts on hangers with large safety pins.
- Bring pattern to judging; your ribbon placing will be lowered by one without it.
- 6. Enter quilts in Fiber Arts Project.
- 7. Pre-cut kits are acceptable for all clothing classes. All articles/garments must be finished for use.
- 8. Educational Exhibit Classes. Share with others what you learned in this project. Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook or display. Follow Copyright laws as you are preparing your exhibit. No card table displays are allowed. (See General Rules for poster and display guidelines.)
- 9. 4-Hers will be notified if their construction project won an award s they can attend the Public Revue, that evening, to receive their award.
- 10. State Fair Special Rules. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two exhibits in Sewing Construction, must be in two different classes.
