


- **September 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2:00p, Paola Extension Office:** Symposium Committee Meeting.





She was instrumental in me becoming a mentor so soon after I joined the EMG group. Of my 8 years being an EMG, this is my 4<sup>th</sup> time being involved in the Mentor program. Now I sit as the chairperson for the program. I hope I do her justice.

There were a few other times sharing a glass of wine with her over the next few years, then I became focused on other 'life' preoccupations. When we did speak or exchanged messages during this time, she always asked how it was going with things (that were going on at that time). She told me I was doing "a good thing and this too shall pass." And she was right.


